Carlton Trail names new president, CEO

WATROUS — Shelley Romanyszyn-Cross is the new president and chief executive officer of Carlton Trail College.

The college, which has branches in Watrous, Wynyard and Humboldt, announced the appointment in a news release on Tuesday.

Romanyszyn-Cross is a former Davidson resident who began her career with Carlton Trail at the former campus here.

In the news release, she was quoted as saying she was honoured and humbled by the appointment, and excited to continue the work of delivering programs and services to meet the needs of students and the region at large.

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"The transformational effect that education can have on an individual and those around them is incredible," she was

Carlton Trail's board chair, Glenn Hepp, lauded her "extensive experience with the College and knowledge of the . . . region, programs and staff."

"Her leadership skills will help to ensure the success of the college for many years to come," he said.

Romanyszyn-Cross began working for the college in 2001, when she became community program facilitator at the Davidson campus. She moved to Watrous in 2005 to become industry

and trades co-ordinator.

She became senior academic officer in 2008, a position she continues to hold.

Romanyszyn-Cross became interim president and CEO earlier this year and was appointed to the positions permanently in August.

In addition to her role at Carlton Trail, she is involved with several working groups and committees related to the province's post-secondary education system.

She holds a Bachelor of Arts with honours in public administration and psychology from the University of Saskatchewan and a Masters of Adult Education from the University of Regina.

She and her husband, Al Cross, live in Watrous and have two children: Cayle, 19, and Zach, 16.
